Village Hall News

We accepted the offer of funding to continue opening the Hall as a Warm Hub on Mondays until the end of April but reduced the hours to 10.30 am – 12.30 pm, because virtually nobody had been taking advantage of the facility outside those times. Thanks again to all who have volunteered to run these sessions through the colder months of the year, as well as to Cambridgeshire ACRE for the organisation and to the original providers of the funds. We were particularly pleased that the sessions served to host the meeting about the future of the Prior's Field GP surgery and the visit by the NHS Covid and flu vaccination team.

All of you except fairly recent incomers will recall the annual Produce and Craft Show as a highlight and one of the best-attended regular village events. Although entries of garden and allotment produce declined over the years, craft items amply made up for this, and the Show ceased not for want of public support but because there were no longer enough people willing and able to undertake the work of organising it. A small financial balance remained, and this was entrusted to our Committee to hold in the hope that the Show or something on similar lines might be revived in the future. More recently the family of the late Sandy Jackson, one of the stalwart long-term organisers of the Show, entrusted us also with the collection of prize trophy cups, many bearing the names of villagers who had donated them in past times. Significant numbers of you have moved into Mepal since 2019 and we wonder whether there might now be enough volunteers to organise an event, ideally as a regular feature, that could make use of these assets.

The defibrillator outside the Post Office and Shop is unfortunately now past its sell-by, and we are joining with the Parish Council in sharing the cost of a new one, which will be installed on the outside of the Hall. It's vital that everyone knows where it is to be, because every second counts in the sort of medical emergency that a defibrillator is designed to deal with.

To celebrate the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III in May, we shall be serving a Royal Cream Tea between 3.00 and 4.30 pm on Bank Holiday Monday 8th May. We are pleased to announce that on this special occasion refreshments will be FREE OF CHARGE. Supplies will of course be limited, so don't leave it too late to turn up, because when it's all gone, it's gone.

Our public Annual General Meeting will be on Wednesday 10th May starting at 8 pm. As usual, this is your opportunity to hear about the work of our Committee during the past year, to ask questions, and also to volunteer to join our Committee. We have been fortunate in the past two years to recruit some new members,

but others have resigned after making valuable contributions to our work, and we can always do with more.

Further funding secured to support impacts of the energy crisis

Local charity, PECT, in partnership with Cambridgeshire ACRE are to continue free energy advice service to households in Cambridgeshire (Fenland, Huntingdonshire, East Cambridgeshire, Cambridge City).

After the cold weather we have experienced over the last few weeks, and the rise in energy costs, we are all feeling the pinch when it comes to our energy bills.

Residents can benefit from an advice call or a home visit with an experienced energy advisor. They will be able to share tips on how you can save money on your energy bills, access financial support, improve your home efficiency and reduce any energy debts.

They are also delivering training to front-line workers to help them support residents with basic energy advice and where to direct help.

Nikki Dekker, Energy Lead at PECT comments, "At the moment support like this is much needed. We hope we can continue to help households save money, be comfortable and warm in their homes, and also reduce energy use or make sustainable changes that have a positive impact on the environment. With Cambridgeshire ACRE and the support of local frontline workers, this service will make a difference to many households in the community."



Prevent theft from a vehicle

Those of you who follow the Mepal People Facebook Group may have read at the end of March the news that a car thief was spotted in the village on security and doorbell cameras. Unfortunately, a number of Mepal residents lost belongings to this thief so we have been asked to share some advice from Cambridgeshire Police on how to prevent theft from your vehicles.



Having your car broken into and losing your things to thieves can be very distressing. Here are a few simple steps you can take to keep your vehicle, and what's in it. safe.



1. Always lock it

Fuelling up or popping back into your house to get something are perfect examples of how easy it is to turn your back for a moment and forget your vehicle is unsecured. So get into the habit of locking your vehicle even if you're only going to be away from it for a moment.

If your vehicle has wing mirrors that fold in automatically when locked, make sure you lock it properly. Criminal gangs are looking for vehicles like these where the wing mirrors are still out because it is clear to them that the vehicle has been left unlocked.

2. Close windows and the sun roof to prevent 'fishing'

Leaving windows and the sunroof open invites fishing for items through the gap by hand or with, say, a bent coat hanger, which could also be used to unlock a door for them to get in. Thieves can be ingenious. Don't give them the opportunity.

3. Secure your number plates with tamper-resistant screws


The easiest way to change the identity of a stolen vehicle or avoid speeding tickets and parking tickets is to fit stolen number plates. Using security screws to attach your vehicle's number plates makes it harder for thieves to get your number.

4. Fit locking, anti-tamper wheel nuts to secure alloy wheels

Stolen wheels are valuable, either as parts or for their scrap value. Using locking wheel nuts reduces the risk of your vehicle's wheels being stolen.

5. Secure anything that's on the outside of your vehicle

Anything left on roof-racks, tailgate racks, holiday top boxes or in tool chests are easily stolen when the vehicle is parked. The use of cable locks, padlocks and self-locking tools chests, which are secured to the vehicle, makes them more secure, but still, don't leave things in them if you can avoid it. 6. Take it with you or hide it

Your mobile phone, coins for the car park, sunglasses, packs of medication or other items that can earn quick cash are irresistible to the opportunist thief. Remember, the cost of replacing a window is often much more than that of what's stolen. And it should go without saying that wallets, handbags, purses and credit cards should never be left in an unattended vehicle.

7. Hide electrical items and leave no clues

Leaving sat nav mounts, suction cup marks on windows or cables on view gives it away that you have left a Sat Nav, smartphone or other device in your car. Even if they can't see the Sat Nav or iPad they might still break in to see if it's stored in the car, out of sight.

8. Tool theft from vans

Vans are often targeted by thieves for the tools stored inside. If you have to leave tools in a van overnight, it's a good idea to mark them clearly with your name / company name and address using paint pens and seal with a clear lacquer spray. Alternatively, you can use a variety of other property marking systems. Items that are clearly marked are less desirable and more difficult to sell on.

Consider using a lockable cabinet within your van to store tools—a number of security rated products are available. Small cameras are also designed to record inside vehicles. Visit https://securedbydesign.com/ for more details.

You can also take photographs of items of value, make a note of the serial numbers and consider registering them online at a property register site.



9. Park in well-lit and busier areas

It can take less than 30 seconds to break into a vehicle. Parking in well-lit areas and busy streets increases the chances of a thief being seen, so they'll probably steer clear.

10. Take your documents with you

Having a vehicle's registration and insurance documents could let a thief pretend to be the owner. Which means they could sell it on quite easily. So, never leave any documents in the vehicle.

11. Choose your car park wisely

If possible, always try to park in well-lit and staffed car parks or those with a Park Mark safer parking award. To find one, simply check out Park Mark: http://www.parkmark.co.uk/car-park-finder

The Parish Council elections will be held on 4th May and we can now confirm that for Mepal, this will be an uncontested election and that Brian Rollason, Lorna Williams, Jack Hickman, Samantha Knightley and Jim Stewart will be duly elected as your Parish Councillors. This will leave two casual vacancies that can be filled by co-option. The Chairman for the forthcoming year will be elected at the annual meeting of the Parish Council that is scheduled to be held on Monday 22nd May at 18:30.

At the Annual Parish Meeting held on 11th April 2023 in the Community Pavilion, only one member of the public and County and District Councillor Lorna Dupre were present. Chairman Brian Rollason presented his annual report and detailed the achievements of the previous 12 months. Hard copies of the annual report were made available at the meeting and will also be available at the annual meeting of the Parish Council. At the end of the Parish Council Meeting that followed the Annual Parish Meeting, Chairman Brian Rollason thanked Councillor Lorna Delanoy for her valuable input and ideas over the last year as Lorna had decided that she would not stand for election and so this would be her final Parish Council Meeting as a Councillor.

Old Mepal Road Highways gravel piles

You may have noticed that after a huge effort by one of the parishioners, the County Council have now removed the waste gravel on the old Mepal Road. This will make a huge difference to the area and we would just remind dog walkers using this route to please remember to pick up all dog poo and use the bin provided at the entrance to the road.

Vandalism

Unfortunately we need to report that graffiti in the Laurel Close Playpark has meant that we have had to clean and repaint some areas. We are also increasingly receiving reports of children and young teenagers choosing to ignore the signs clearly stating that the storage containers should not be climbed on. They have black anti-climb paint on the top, so please make sure your children understand that it is not safe to try to climb on the top to sunbathe! If your child comes home covered in black marks, please make sure you talk to them and get them to change their behaviour. Please note that we provide the CCTV footage to the police and report all incidents, so we ask the community to work together to educate young people that this behaviour is not acceptable.

The noticeboard on the Playpark has not yet been repaired after the previous vandalism smashed the front, but is on the to-do list to re-instate its use; for now we just have a smaller board on the front of the Pavilion.

No Defibrillator located outside the Mepal Stores

You may not be aware but the Village had two defibrillators (one at the pavilion entrance and one at the village shop which was an older unit). They are both registered on the Circuit, a national scheme that monitors registered units.

At the Parish Council meeting on 11th April a resolution was passed to work with the Village Hall Committee and replace the unit with a new model in a heated cabinet and to install it on the outside of the Village Hall as a matter of urgency. On 12th April, the unit at the shop was removed to use in an emergency to save a life, but we did not get any warning message from the Circuit (where the two units are registered) and only found out when the Clerk took a message on a non-working day from the East Anglian Ambulance Service.

We are working as fast as we can to get the new improved unit in place, but for now please be aware that there is no longer a working unit outside the shop, but the one at the Pavilion is still available.

You should always call 999 in any situation that involves cardiac arrest, and they will direct you to the nearest available defibrillator if appropriate.
